Muslim Benefactors of Muslim Studies Endowment at MSU

Driven by compassion that is embedded in Islamic traditions, some members of the Michigan Muslim community have established an endowed fund, known as the Muslim Benefactors of Muslim Studies Endowment at MSU

The purpose of this endowment is to support education, research and outreach in ways that benefit students and faculty of the Muslim Studies Program, regardless of their religious beliefs.



The Muslim Studies Program

The Muslim Studies Program at MSU is concerned with the big questions facing Muslim societies today. The Program seeks to explore the rich diversity of Muslim communities. It encourages students to acquire a solid background in the history, religion and culture of Muslim peoples in general, while exploring in depth particular Muslim societies and polities in Asia, Africa, the Middle East, and Europe. This endowment will provide additional resources to strengthen Muslim Studies at MSU as well as highlight the desire of Muslim Benefactors and community to make private contributions for the public good.

Shortly after September 11, Michigan State University began what Mohammed Ayoob, University Distinguished Professor of International Relations and Coordinator of the Muslim Studies Program, describes as the Muslim Studies initiative. This involved a series of discussions, curriculum enhancements and outreach activities to promote better understanding of Muslim peoples. The Initiative spawned a Muslim Studies Undergraduate Specialization in 2004.

The success of these efforts led to the formation of the Muslim Studies Program in 2006. As a cross regional thematic center of MSU's International Studies and Programs, the Program has a symbiotic relationship with the academic specialization that supports the study of Muslim societies and Islam in a wide range of disciplines and topics.

Impact of Muslim Studies

The influence of MSU's education, research and outreach extends into neighborhoods, businesses, schools, hospitals, and communities close to home and around the world.

Most recently, MSU reached far beyond its East Lansing campus and created a new educational site in the Gulf Region, MSU Dubai. It is these developments along with the MSU faculty and students that create the important intersections where Muslim Studies informs and educates as well as builds bridges and understanding with Muslim Americans and the Muslim world.

A recent example of the impact of the Muslim Studies Program is a project undertaken in collaboration with the MSU School of Journalism and designed to help generate more accurate reporting about Muslim societies. This project recently culminated in a major conference on "Islam, Muslims and the Media" and in the setting up of a Web site "IMAJE: Islam, Muslims and Journalism Education" aimed at educating journalists and journalism students about reporting on Islam and Muslims. Additionally, the Muslim Studies Program holds regular lectures, special symposia and events on topics important to the Muslim world.

Through a program that is not only interdisciplinary but intercontinental, Muslim Studies at MSU is a leader, advancing knowledge and transforming lives.
